AFMS Rockhounds "Code of Ethics"

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use. I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials

on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

President's Ramblings

I have been musing on the role that water plays in regard to rockhounding. Water in its frozen state is classified as a mineral, but when liquid, is the most corrosive compound on earth. Water is one of the primary factors in erosion; it can literally bring down mountains. In its frozen form, the fact that turning to ice it actually grows in size, leads to a freeze thaw cycle that can expand and break even the largest rocks. On a larger scale glaciers scour rock beneath them and become carriers of rocks that fall on them.

Now we get to flowing water, our rivers. Visually one of the easiest examples of the way water is weathering away the landscape is to look at canyons and at the bottom of those canyons you find a river, or evidence that of a river that existed in a distant past.

The really important thing about erosion to rockhounds: it is the primary mechanism that takes rocks and minerals out of bedrock and deposits them along the beaches, bars and benches of rivers and oceans. I know

we collectors have broken out our hammers and chisels to help speed up the natural erosion processes. We as humans do not live on geologic time, we live in it.

My real point is for you to think about where you find the rocks and minerals. So next time you're out collecting and find your favorite rock, stop, look around and ask yourself "how the heck did this get here." The answer likely points to water in some way or another.
